Dear Friends and Colleagues of EMM,

This annual report highlights the work of Episcopal Migration Ministries for the 2019 calendar year. EMM issues this report with the disconcerting knowledge that out of 1.4 million refugees estimated to be in urgent need of resettlement worldwide, only 63,696 were resettled in 2019 through UNHCR, the UN Refugee Agency. Worldwide, 70 million individuals are displaced, and that number grows each day by 37,000 people forced to flee their homes because of conflict and persecution. Among them are nearly 25.9 million refugees, half of whom are under the age of 18.

Behind the numbers and financial data contained in this report, there are hundreds of local individuals from service providers, local government officials, school districts, churches, volunteers and many others who together form a cohort that provides a welcoming experience for refugees and their new neighbors. It is these individual relationships between local community and newcomers that are the backbone of the ministry.

One bright spot to highlight in 2019 is the response EMM had with its Partners in Welcome program in its first year of operation. Partners in Welcome (PiW) is EMM's network of organizations and individuals dedicated to welcoming newcomers, educating communities, and developing advocates. The network now has 377 members from 82 dioceses in 43 states and the District of Columbia.

At EMM, we are thankful for the response to this facet of the ministry. We take this opportunity to say again that you have gifts and talents you can use to welcome your newest neighbors. EMM is here to connect and assist you or your congregation on your journey of discernment with the issue surrounding migration through individual and group volunteer opportunities, and other partnership possibilities. We invite you to join the PiW network.

At the start of the 2020 calendar year, major challenges lie ahead for refuges and asylum-seekers. The Episcopal Church through EMM will continue to offer hope, as it has for over 80 years, in welcome and support for all God's displaced children.

One last note: In 2019, EMM marked a sad occasion. Richard Parkins, the former director of EMM, our colleague and a mentor to many, passed away. He once said that it was friendship which was the greatest need that an Episcopal parish can provide a refugee. I close with his words, "Befriending a refugee helps the process of healing." Join in this ministry and support our efforts, just as Jesus called us to do.



EMM's engagement unit launched Partners in Welcome, an online learning community and ministry network for Episcopalians and members of the general public. Partners in Welcome (PiW) is EMM's network of organizations and individuals dedicated to welcoming newcomers, educating communities, and developing advocates. The network has 377 members from 82 dioceses in 43 states and the District of Columbia.



EMM released season two of the Hometown podcast in 2019, which featured interviews with women and men resettled to the U.S. as refugees, the history and background of refugee-producing countries, and spiritual reflections from lay members and clergy across The Episcopal Church. In addition, in-between season episodes included advocacy and policy updates, webinar recordings, and opportunities to get involved in the ministry of welcome. Listeners can subscribe to the podcast on Spotify, SoundCloud, Apple Podcasts, Google Play, and Stitcher and can find episodes and supplemental material on the EMM website blog.

Education & Outreach

Love God, Love Neighbor

EMM hosted abbreviated Love God, Love Neighbor (LGLN) trainings in Chicago, Illinois, and Washington, D.C. in 2019. These two-day trainings focused on the global displacement crisis, United States refugee policy, faith-based advocacy for refugees, and ways to organize to welcome and support refugees.





Thanks to the generosity of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints,

refugee families across 13 cities in the United States have been welcomed home through gifts of food and furniture.

17 households received tables to use for family dinners, as well as to show hospitality to friends and community members.

153 people received mattresses and bed frames, giving newly arrived families a comfortable and safe place to rest.

In Houston, Texas, food provided by Bishop's Storehouses is used by a women's empowerment group. The group holds cooking classes and is currently creating a cookbook together. As part of the program, each woman receives a gift box of pantry items to stock a kitchen. 124 pillows, 92 chairs, and 40 dressers were given to assist 156 families
