WELCOME

Dear friends,

In the summer of 2022, The Episcopal Church passed <u>General Convention Resolution D045</u>: "On Supporting LGBTIQ+ Refugees and Asylum Seekers." The resolution called on the Church to focus attention on "persons forced to seek refugee or asylee status because they fear being persecuted based on their sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression and/or sex characteristics" through advocacy and also asked Episcopal Migration Ministries to "highlight the issues surrounding LGBTQI+ refugees and asylees and offer information on ways of support, including ... for example, in their Toolkit for Congregations." Honoring that request, we are offering this resource, The Rainbow Initiative Toolkit for Congregations, to Episcopal congregations and the broader community of individuals and organizations that work with and for people who have been forced from their home countries in search of safety.

The statement The Episcopal Church made with resolution D045 is important and timely. In 2023 and continuing into 2024, it is illegal to be LGBTQ+ in about 70 countries, and 11 of those prescribe the death penalty. In many more countries, attacks against and murder of LGBTQ+ people go unprosecuted. Religion is used to justify much of the persecution that LGBTQ+ people face worldwide, including in countries in which member churches of the Anglican Communion are present. Here at home, various U.S. state governments are passing anti-LGBTQ+ legislation, causing members of the LGBTQ+ community to consider and take steps to move to different parts of the country so they can live safely and access the medical care they need and deserve.

As the migration ministry of The Episcopal Church and a refugee resettlement agency since 1988, EMM serves newly arriving refugees and other forcibly displaced persons, and the local organizations and churches that welcome and support them. Some individuals who arrived in the country as refugees, and those who come to the country seeking protection through the asylum process, have fled persecution because of their LGBTQ+ identity. EMM's responsibility to support and welcome this population is twofold: 1) As a refugee resettlement agency, we equip our resettlement partners to provide culturally appropriate services and orientation to all newcomers, regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity. 2) As a ministry of the church, we are called to provide education, worship and prayer resources, and opportunities for service in migration ministry to all congregations. Through the Rainbow Initiative and this toolkit, we aim specifically to increase awareness, understanding, sensitivity, and ability to take action to advocate for, welcome, and support LGBTQ+ forced migrants.

This toolkit is merely a starting place for personal and congregational learning, prayer, witness, and service. We hope you find the materials meaningful, and that they inspire you and others to take additional steps. Please feel free to contact us at any time with questions, and to discuss opportunities for welcome and sponsorship of LGBTQ+ forced migrants and other newcomers. We look forward to working with you.

ABOUT THE RAINBOW INITIATIVE

The Rainbow Initiative was created in response to <u>2022 General Convention Resolution</u> <u>D045</u>, which resolved that The Episcopal Church should focus attention on "persons forced to seek refugee or asylee status because they fear being persecuted based on their sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression and/or sex characteristics." The resolution includes a "request that Episcopal Migration Ministries highlight the issues surrounding LGBTQI+ refugees and asylees and offer information on ways of support..." and refers to advocacy directed towards intergovernmental organizations and the United States government.

In accordance with its mission, EMM's plan for the Rainbow Initiative focused primarily on working with Episcopal congregations and other organizations at the grassroots level. Major elements of the plan included building a national network of relevant groups to focus on LGBTQ+ forced migrants; developing and providing educational and worship resources to those groups and their members; raising awareness of LGBTQ+ forced migration within The Episcopal Church and more broadly; and encouraging activity centered on June 2023, including Pride Month and World Refugee Day (June 20th) events.



THE RAINBOW INITIATIVE



The Rainbow Initiative is a program of Episcopal Migration Ministries (EMM), the refugee resettlement and migration ministry of The Episcopal Church. It was created in 2023 in response to a decision of the Church in the summer of 2022 (General Convention Resolution D045) to focus attention on people who have been forced to leave their countries of origin because of persecution based on sexual orientation or gender identity. The Initiative is working with congregations and communities throughout the United States and Europe to draw attention to LGBTQ+ forced migrants in Pride Events and beyond. Welcome LGBTQ+ Asylum Seekers

About LGBTQ+ Forced Migrants

A "forced migrant" is someone who is compelled to leave their country of citizenship or origin because of persecution. They may be designated as "refugees," "asylum seekers," "asylees," "undocumented immigrants," or with some other terminology, depending on how they relate to the immigration system of the country where they are located.

It is illegal to be LGBTQ+ in about 70 countries, and 11 now prescribe the death penalty. In many more countries, attacks and murder against LGBTQ+ people go unprosecuted.

Religion is used to justify much of the persecution that LGBTQ+ people face worldwide. At the same time, many LGBTQ+ people who have been persecuted remain religious themselves, and much of the help that they receive is motivated by religion.

If and when they reach the U.S., LGBTQ+ forced migrants are more likely to be asylum seekers (about 30,000 per year) or undocumented immigrants, than they are to be refugees (about 1,000 per year). These legal differences are important because asylum seekers are unable to work legally for at least 180 days after they have filed their asylum application, and they are ineligible for many government-funded benefit programs. Undocumented immigrants also face these challenges. Individuals admitted to the U.S. as refugees, on the other hand, arrive with immediate work authorization, access to various public assistance programs, and a pathway to citizenship.

Many LGBTQ+ people are alienated from the social support systems that most forced migrants depend on in order to survive, such as their families and ethnic community associations. This social isolation, coupled with the lack of work authorization, makes them particularly vulnerable to homelessness, extreme poverty, and exploitation.

Nevertheless, LGBTQ+ forced migrants are often strong, determined, and hopeful: Successfully fleeing from persecution requires enormous strength and determination. They bring their talents and energy to their new communities. And throughout their journeys towards safety, they are driven by hope for a better future.

"Internally displaced people" have fled persecution but remained within their country of citizenship. Many LGBTQ+ Americans can relate to this experience, and have relied on Episcopal and other congregations to provide them with a warm welcome in their new communities. This same welcome is extremely important for people who have had to cross international borders in order to reach safety.

Why Should Christians Care?

The call to "welcome the stranger" through protection and hospitality is deeply rooted in many religions, including Christianity. Christian scripture and tradition emphasize seeing Jesus in all people, and particularly in those who are persecuted and in need of help.

Religion is interwoven with the persecution many LGBTQ+ people experience. It can also be interwoven with their welcome and healing.
